# **Course Description**

Biology 54 is a general education course for Area E that introduces some major issues in health and disease, psychological stress, and aging. Emphasis is on learning how to understand and apply physiologic information for human understanding and lifelong learning. There are no prerequisites.

This class is an online/web based course. Please make sure you have reliable WiFi and up to date AntiVirus software.

**This class is not self-paced**. You will have deadlines and they will not be adjusted unless there is an issue that affects the entire class. Online class, although more convenient for lecture attendance than in-person, are still as rigorous. Why is this material important: You will use this to help support your two large assignments – a literature review paper (100 points), an Oral Presentation Video (100 points) and overall student success. This will also greatly help you on the open note research methods quiz (25 points), but you can easily use the copies in the library if you do not wish to purchase. This resource is meant to support students who are new to communicating in the sciences and do not have experience with primary literature review papers and/or video/presentation creation. ## **Course Requirements and Assignments**

SJSU classes are designed such that in order to be successful, it is expected that students will spend a minimum of forty-five hours for each unit of credit (normally three hours per unit per week), including preparing for class, participating in course activities, completing assignments, and so on. Online Canvas Activities (up to 255 points): Online class activities involve students working alone or in small online groups analyzing scientific writings, finding and evaluating information for personal growth and societal use, and constructing effective written and oral presentations. **Exams (Midterm and Final: 100 points each):** The exams will include information from lectures, readings, discussions, and activities. The exams may consist of multiple choice, short answer and/or essay. All exams will be completed online. Please see assignment list below for dates of exams.

# **Missed Exams and Late Assignments**

Exams cannot be made up. If there is a verifiable emergency that prevents you from taking your online exam, contact me immediately via email with the details of your emergency and we will go from there. Generally, for those students that have a verifiable emergency you will receive the average of your other exam in lieu of your one missed exam. If you do not have a verifiable/documented emergency then you will receive the average of your other exam minus a 20% penalty. These scores will be inputted at the end of the semester.

No late assignments will be accepted in this course. You can submit weekly assignments anytime before the due date.

**Emotional Intelligence 2.0 (30 points):** Begin by taking the online Emotional Intelligence Quiz. Once you are finished, please take a snapshot of your results (utilize your computer's Screen Shot function) and upload this screenshot to the Canvas folder "Emotional Intelligence Quiz" for 5 points. If you wish to blackout your actual score, that is fine. As long as I can see that your completed the quiz. Then for the remaining 25 points, read the entire book and answers the questions located in the Emotional Intelligence 2.0 Worksheet found on Canvas. If you do not submit a copy of your Emotional Intelligence Quiz you will receive a zero for the entire assignment.

# **Literature Review Paper (100 points)**

This will be a literature review paper based upon your research in the peer-reviewed journals. You will need to utilize *Write, Present, Create: Science Communication for Undergraduates* for assistance in completing this in a scientific journal style and tone. More detailed information about this assignment can be found in a separate document. You can submit this assignment anytime before the due date. You have only one chance to do well on this assignment. If you do not do well, there are zero opportunities for a makeup, second chance, or "do-over".

Mean Genes Assigned Reading Journal (50 points): For each chapter of our assigned book, Mean Genes, you must write a one paragraph summary of the chapter and create two exam style questions with answers. Each chapter should be clearly labeled with the summary followed by the two questions with answers. This needs to be done for every chapter.

<u>Digital Oral Presentation Project</u> (100 points): In order to pass this course, you must complete this assignment. This will be a presentation on a selected topic of importance to human health and well-being. You will record and upload your presentation for your grading. Please see the separate document for full information on this assignment. You have only one chance to do well on this assignment. If you do not do well, there are zero opportunities for a makeup, second chance, or "do-over". You will also be required to watch and submit notes on fellow student's presentations.

#### Final Examination or Evaluation
